



Reaching out into the Community

Blood Drive

• St. James held three Memorial Blood Center blood drives in 2008.

Dinner At Your Door

- In 2008, St. James was asked to put an additional route on the Dinner at Your Door schedule. We now furnish nine drivers per month, each with their own route at two Dinner At Your Door sites, which are Crystal Community Center and North Memorial Hospital. In a nutshell, we furnish 27 drivers who spend 174 hours delivering 864 hot meals per year.
- This year, we had drivers who were willing to be regular drivers, which means they drive the same
 route every month all year long. Thanks to all who participate in this challenge and are willing to
 give of their time to help those in need. Our service hours at DAYD are greatly appreciated by the
 recipients.

Global Health Ministries

- A crew from St. James volunteered every Thursday from 9 a.m. to 2 p.m. (with stops for coffee and lunch of course) at Global Health Ministries. They sorted, packaged and took inventory of the medical supplies.
- In 2008, Global Health Ministries donated 40 surplus pallets of medical supplies to Medical Teams International, 22 pallets to Operation Blessing International and 12 pallets to Globe Aid Network.
- Ten of their big shipments of 40 and 20 foot sea containers have gone to Cameroon, Tanzania, Liberia, Papua New Guinea, India and Madagascar.

Loaves & Fishes

- St. James in partnership with House of Hope Lutheran, has served at River of Life Lutheran Church (22nd & Fremont Ave N) since 1984. The clientele enjoys a hot meal served with respectful and caring hands.
- From January to November 2008, St. James made and served 1,847 individual meals. The total cost was \$1,830.61, at 99 cents per meal.
- There are nine other Loaves & Fishes sites. The number of individuals has risen 15% at all the serving sites in 2008.

Car Care Saturday

• We continue to serve our neighbors by providing oil changes and maintenance checks for their vehicles. In both April and October, we serviced the vehicles of more than 30 families in need. Some return every six months and have become friends, while others find themselves newly on hard times. The people whom we help are so grateful; it makes Car Care a wonderful ministry.

Power of One

 Seventeen volunteers have partnered with teachers at Forest Elementary, to help children with reading, math, library duties or anything else the teachers need during the week. Principal Connie Grumdahl, Gail Svor and the staff at Forest continue to be impressed by and deeply grateful for our partnership with their school.

Lutefisk Dinner

• A whopping 470 people enjoyed the Annual Lutefisk & Meatball Dinner in November. The volunteers are amazing as they started preparations in October. Jerry Sultvedt was once again hard pressed to turn any "Lutefisk Lover" away. Everyone had a great time!

Street Dance

- What fun for everyone at the second Annual Street dance in September! It was a beautiful night and well attended by many visitors as well as St. James' members.
- Ron and Carol Olson coordinated the food, which was a major hit. Laughter filled the air at the bingo table. Volunteers donated their time, talents, prizes and baskets.
- Plans call for a Street Dance in 2009 tentatively on September 11, so mark your calendars. Invite your friends and neighbors and plan to be there!

Ebenezer Auxiliary

- Fund raising is a major goal for the Ebenezer Auxiliary. During the past year, the Auxiliary has been a
 sponsor for a Salad Luncheon, Ice Cream Social, Gifts of Love at Christmas, Operation Love for
 Valentine's Day and a Waffle Breakfast. Hands and Hearts Estate Sales and the Ebenezer Hall Gift
 Shop are also sources of funding.
- There is always a need for volunteers. The support of St. James' members is appreciated.
- The mission of the Ebenezer Society is to support older adults and to help make their lives more independent, meaningful and secure.

NEAR

- NEAR stands for Northwest Suburban Emergency Assistance Response. In 2008, NEAR served
 an average of 253 families a month. From January through October 2008, a total of 9,099
 individual meals were distributed. There have been an average of 10 new clients a week during
 2008.
- NEAR distributes food to families once a month. Extra boxes of food are given for Thanksgiving and Christmas. Easter baskets are given to children. School supplies were supplied to 388 students in August. Deliveries were also made to handicapped clients.

Altar Guild



Nursery

- Lauren Skalicky took over for Donalee Eggleston as Nursery Coordinator in June of 2008.
- With a generous donation, new storage bins were purchased to hold all the toys.



- The choir grew in size this past year, but is always looking for more voices.




• St. James said good-bye to *The Inversions* Praise Band in August 2008. The group will be missed.

Faith Formation: Family Ministry

Little Lambs & Sunday School

- What a year! Currently, there are 12 children ages two and under enrolled in the Little Lambs class, which takes place in the nursery. Parents and children attend together, learning a story which corresponds with each letter of the alphabet.
- Downstairs in the Sunday School classrooms, children ages three through 4th grade are studying what it means to live in community. During the fall months, 5th graders learned some of the major stories and lessons of the Old Testament. Overall, 45 children are enrolled in Sunday School, and it is a blessing and honor to pass faith along to the children of St. James!

Cross + Generational Sunday School/Outreach

This year, the name "Family Sunday School" was changed to "Cross+Generational" to be more
inclusive and welcoming to those who don't have children in Sunday School any longer, or may
not necessarily come to church with a family. These events were a huge success and helped the
children understand more about St. James' Outreach Partners.

Day Camps

• Camp Creation was the theme of this year's day camps 34 children. They learned about a different part of the creation story each day, beginning with God creating light and dark. They heard the creation story, as well as other stories, learned songs, played games, made different kinds of snacks and crafts, and had a blast! St. James hosted two different weeks of day camp; a week in June for children ages four through 2nd grade, and a week in July for children in 3rd grade through 5th grade. Many thanks go to the teachers who made those two weeks possible in June and July.

Special Event: Faith 24-7, Taking Faith Outside the Walls of St. James

Marilyn Sharpe, a speaker and leader with the Youth and Family Institute in Minneapolis was

Faith Formation: Middle School Youth

Confirmation

- Fall Confirmation 2008 kicked off with a really, really fun retreat at Luther Park in Danbury, Wisconsin. The theme of the retreat was "Who Am I?" The campfire along Lake 26, the games and sharing, cabin fun and conversation in the car were all very memorable!
- Baptism and Holy Communion were the fall focus with teaching times on Baptism & the Family of Faith, Jesus as the Passover Lamb, and "Word, Wine, and Bread" give God's life to our life.
- On November 5, St. James confirmation youth gathered with 3,000 others from Minneapolis and St. Paul at the Minneapolis Convention Center around the invitation to recognize God's call to reach out to homeless youth of the metro area.
- In December, Confirmation families met with Pastor David around questions of what is working well and what could work better for the confirmation journey. Out of that meeting, it was decided to have one servant event and one fun event each month for students and their families. The first event was Christmas caroling at local nursing homes and at homes of some of St James' senior members. Even though the weather wasn't good, the turnout was fantastic and it was a very uplifting evening for everyone.

Pizza, Pizza!

- The annual pizza sales in February were a huge hit again this year. It is such a treat for the congregation to get delicious hand-made pizzas and a great fundraiser for the youth (middle school and senior high).

Sunday School

- During the middle school retreat in early fall, the youth spoke up and asked for space to meet on Sunday mornings. The decision was made that the choir room would be their new home. Pastor Michelene donated the couch from her office to make the room more homey. The kids can now come together each Sunday, relax, visit, and share their ups and downs. Their first major activity was distributing flyers to the neighborhood in preparation for collecting food for the NEAR food drive which they completed the following week. They had a great time breaking into teams and walking the neighborhood. They also made cookies one Sunday morning which were shared with the congregation.
- Everything they do is being built around practical life lessons such as compassion, manners, cleanliness, respect, homework, reaching out to others in need, and how this relates to what Jesus taught. It is based on what Jesus would do, or what Jesus would say. Life is a gift from God and everyone is expected to enjoy life as well as share talents in order to have a positive impact on the world, and to take care of this gift of life. Plans are to discuss current events, various school situations, peer pressure, etc. All of the discussion will be in relation to what Jesus is asking us to do, while keeping in mind the Golden Rule.

Lunches were provided following fourteen funerals as a form of hospitality to families in time of need during 2008.

- Meet & Eat continued to be a huge success in 2008. Thanks to Ron & Carol Olson for preparing delicious meals each Wednesday evening.
- A special thanks goes to Marlene McGuire for helping set up Wold Hall each week.

Office Helpers

- A wonderful group of helpers gathered each Friday morning to assemble a total of 15,770 bulletins during 2008. This group also gladly stapled the NEAR flyers to the grocery bags, assembled the Annual Report and funeral bulletins, along with anything else that was asked of them.
- A total of 5.640 Herald newsletters were assembled and driven to the bulk mail center in Minneapolis during 2008.
- Nancy Lohmann proofread the bulletins and Pews News each week and the Herald once each month.
- Thanks to everyone who helped make St. James run smoothly in 2008. We couldn't do it without you!

Holiday Craft Fair

- Over 40 local artists gathered at St. James in November to sell their hand-made items. The proceeds from the sale of vendor spaces and concessions goes to the Senior High Mission Trip Fund. Many of St. James' members and others from the community found treasures to take home with them.
- This event will surely make another appearance in 2009.

Property Committee Accomplishments

- The Lee Warmbo Memorial Rose Garden got a face lift.
- New windows were put in the Montesorri classroom.
- New air conditioners were purchased for the offices.
- An electric eternal candle was installed in the worship center.
- New handrails were installed in the stairway downstairs and up to the choir loft.

Celebrating St. James

Marketing Team

- The marketing team was formed in April 2008. Their focus will be to help groups market their events, as well as marketing for St. James as a whole.
- St. James took the opportunity to connect with members in another way by creating a group page on the social networking website Facebook. The group now has 36 members, made up of prospective, current and former members of St. James. This group now shares photos and event information. You'd be surprised at the age span of the members of the St. James Lutheran Church Crystal, MN group.
- Their major projects in 2008 included: the Street Dance, looking at options for a new outdoor sign, ads in local papers, "Catch the Spirit" campaign in the fall which included sweatshirt sales, and preparing for the Whiz Bang & Crystal Frolic parades.

Archives

- This fall the committee had an original painting titled "Madagascar" framed. It was given to the Missionary committee and members of St. James as a thank you from Patricia Bentsen for sponsoring her while she served as a missionary nurse in Madagascar.
- The Archives room was dusted and scrubbed on Work Day and is now open to anyone with a legitimate purpose.

Library

- The St. James library began 2008 with an extensive display of Laura Ingalls Wilder artifacts, followed throughout the spring and fall with collections of: salt & pepper shakers, rocks, bells, birds and bird houses, Les Lamb's paintings and woodworking projects, Lefton Birthday Angels, cultural heritage items, elephants, old tools, old books, campaign buttons, Halloween figurines, baseball memorabilia, handmade and antique quilts, Armed Forces veterans' souvenirs and memories.
- The library also collected and distributed free books to the parents and children of the participants of Car Care twice in 2008.
- Board members attended Twin City area library workshops for new ideas for library promotion.
- The Summer Reading Club theme was "Hit a Home Run for Reading." Nine children successfully completed the program and earned gift cards to Half Price Books.
- Sunday School classes came for story time and to check out books. Middle school students were a
 great addition this fall as volunteer readers.
- The library staff continued to add new books to the collection, especially for men. The DVD collection was also enlarged.

Faith Formation: Senior High

2008 was a great year for the youth at St. James. We had many wonderful events, a couple of milestones and of course an excellent summer adventure.

Along with the normal youth events like Game Works, Grand Slam, Youth Picnic and Confirmation Banquet, we had a few more memorable moments. ValleyScare this year had the largest turnout I have ever had at St. James with 54 people going that frightful Friday night.

The Easter Brunch was also a fundraiser for the Youth Mission Trip. The youth helped prepare,

serve and clean up Easter morning. It was a great opportunity for the congregation to celebrate Easter with a meal together, and for the youth to help pay for their trip to Colorado.

Another milestone this year was the return of the Lock-In. 11 youth and 2 adults locked themselves in for a fun filled night of games and junk food. Fun was had by all and we didn't even break anything.

Faith Formation: Adults

Mary Circle

- This year the Mary Circle gave back to the community by their monthly giving to the NEAR foodshelf and other local services. They also contributed to Operation Bootstrap Africa to further the high school education of girls in Tanzania.
- On Dec. 6, they hosted the St. James Women's Christmas Brunch, which was a success as always.
- They were fortunate to have Pastor Phil and later in the year Pastor David lead them in Bible study.
- The mission of Mary Circle is the commitment to Bible study and service to the community. The
 members meet each month for Bible study and fellowship. They invite anyone who is interested
 to join Mary Circle.

Rebecca Circle

- Pastors led a Bible study each month with an overview of the books of the Bible with an emphasis
 on how history and context apply to life today.
- The Rebecca Circle hosted a Ladies' Spring Salad Luncheon, with the theme "Bloom Where You Are Planted" in April. Guest speaker, Mary Malone, shared her gardening knowledge with all in attendance.

Adult Education

- Adult Education Sundays at St. James is an ongoing invitation to dig into God's Word, ask the

 present culture.
- Bible Study in 2008 included an in-depth reflection upon the biblical foundations of our stewardship of all God has given for our life together and the life of the world. We also delved into the "deep, deep blue of Advent" and we previewed the ELCA Book of Faith initiative.
- We welcomed wonderful guest speakers who inspired and engaged us. They included Rev. Susan
 Tjornehoj, deployed ELCA staff for New Mission Development, Terri Endres, Director of
 Making a World of Difference, Mpls. Area Synod, and Rev. Grady St. Denis, Office of Church
 Relations, Gustavus Adolphus College. The conversation that was started with Terri Endres was
 so invigorating that we have invited her back to St. James on March 1.
- Study of new books that have a clear spiritual impact are also surveyed and discussed. The Oprah sponsored Eckhart Tolle book *A New Earth: Awakening to Your Life's Purpose* engendered a closer look at the world's spiritual hunger, the teachings of Jesus, and the role of the church today.

Fellowship, Prayer & Support

Over 55

- St. James congregational members who are 55 years "young" meet the fourth Monday of each month unless the program needs a different day. The members gather for the fellowship, programs, entertainment, trips, potlucks, picnics, or plays.
- Individual members help plan the monthly programs. The annual dues are \$5 per person. The
 entire group votes on how to use the money, which is then donated to a worthy cause within the
 church or out in the community. New members are always welcome.

Book Club

- The Page Turners Book Club read 12 amazing books in 2008.
