Pastoral Reflection

Followers of Christ at St. James Lutheran,

During these winter months of longer nights and deepening cold, there are days when we may want to hibernate or flee south to warmer weather. For most of us though, neither hibernation nor moving south is an option. Perhaps one blessing of winter is that it forces us to expand our planning horizons beyond the present day. The inevitable coming of winter imposes urgency upon our preparations.

We remember the autumn preparations for the long winter ahead – farmers and gardeners harvesting their crops and tilling the soil in preparation for the planting season next spring; making sure our vehicles are properly equipped with antifreeze and tires suitable for snowy conditions; and preparing our homes with tight doors and windows to keep out the cold and conserve energy.

Our Lord invites us to experience and enjoy both short-term (live for today), and longer-term (prepare for the coming day of the Lord) perspectives in our lives. Winter is a time to slow down a bit, even as we are mindful of the urgency of each day. It is a time to engage in prayerful, thoughtful discernment and planning for the future. For example, after months of prayer, discernment and meetings, we expect that our alternative worship planning team will be bringing a new worship service to life at St. James. Also, our annual meeting on Sunday, January 25 will present an opportunity for our congregation to reshape and grow our ministries at St. James.

We are also engaged in planning conversations with our sister Bonfire and Wildfire churches about how together we can help each congregation grow stronger and extend the Good News of Jesus Christ into the life and vitality of our communities. In this season of planning, we are called by God to live faithfully and courageously. We are called to practice the spiritual disciplines which will exercise our hearts, minds and souls in order to strengthen our faith: weekly worship, daily Bible study, daily prayer, inviting others to faith, encouraging others in their faith, serving in the name of Christ and giving our financial resources, time and talents to God.

God has called us to live the best life possible, an abundant life pleasing to God. We find many descriptions of such a life in scripture. In the Gospel of John, Jesus encourages his followers to attach themselves to him and to depend on him. In doing so, we will bear much fruit. The Apostle Paul's letter to the Galatian church describes the fruit of God's Holy Spirit this way: "...the fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, generosity, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control." In these dark days of winter, let us grow together in our relationship with Jesus, bearing the fruit of the Holy Spirit. May each of our plans and our lives be united by "Reflecting the Light of Christ in Crystal."

I am grateful to serve our Lord with you as your senior pastor, and excited about the plans God has for us to bear fruit and make a difference for God's glory in our families, our community, and the world.

Alternative Worship Service Update

At the church council's meeting last August, the council voted to accept and implement our congregation's worship committee recommendation that the summer worship format of one blended worship service on Sunday morning continue through the program year, September through May. It also supported the formation and work of a team to explore creating a new worship service which would help our congregation attract worshippers who seek a worship experience different from what we now offer. An alternative worship team formed early in September and has been at work ever since. The current members are Dee Burrington, Denise Compton, Betty Sultvedt, Jeannette Valentine, Sarah Valentine, Emily Valentine and Pastor Randy. However, anyone who is interested in this project is welcomed to join. As a team, we have visited the contemporary/alternative worship services at seven or eight churches in the metro area in order to gather new ideas and experience what other congregations are doing. We have also developed an internship position description for a contemporary Christian worship leader, and are sending this position description to Christian colleges in the metro area with the goal of creating an internship which will provide valuable worship music leadership experience for qualified college students and also help us implement a worship service featuring contemporary Christian music.

The most difficult issue we are grappling with is when our new, alternative worship service should be offered. Most folks on our team favor an 11:00 a.m. worship service for a number of very good reasons. However, we recognize the vitality, unity and life which the single Sunday morning worship has brought to our congregation and the very positive feedback which has resulted, both from members and visitors. The key tasks remaining are to secure the services of one or more contemporary Christian musicians, implement a worship planning team to design and support this worship service, and make the very difficult decision about when the service will be held. Please join the team at 10:15 a.m. on Sunday morning, December 7 for a brunch and an opportunity to share your thoughts about our current worship schedule and about a new, alternative worship service. Please hold the work of this team in your prayers and feel free to contact any of its members with questions or suggestions!





Outreach Partner: NEAR Food Shelf

Help provide warm nutritious food items for families that have fallen on hard times by donating to the March Food Drive. This will be the 41st year that St. James has supported the NEAR Food Shelf. NEAR serves the north half of New Hope, Crystal, and Robbinsdale. In a twelve month period, NEAR distributed an average of 39,112 pounds of food each month to an average of 381 households. Each week new clients are added who are having trouble feeding themselves and their families.



The food shelf stocks shelves, accepts food, and sorts this food each morning (with 8-10 volunteers). Each afternoon from 1:30-

4:30 at least 21 families receive their monthly distribution (with 5 or 6 volunteers). In March 2014 St. James donated over \$5,000 and 240 pounds of food. It is a great time to give since there is a match from The Feinstein Corporation. If you choose to give a monetary donation, please write your check to St. James with NEAR on the memo line. Check out the display case to see what NEAR pays for items at EFN and Second Harvest.. Especially needed are green beans, peas, fruit, tuna, tomatoes, pork and beans, pasta, tomato sauce and cereal. 
