## Annual Report to Minneapolis Area Synod Congregations

I began my work as interim bishop on August 1, 2011. I have been working hard catching up with all of you. Obviously, I will never get to know everything about the Minneapolis Area Synod in this short period of time. However, what I have learned about you is very impressive. Here are a few things I have learned:

- You are the largest synod in the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (192,000 members in 159 congregations).
- You collectively give \$123,000,000 every year through your congregations.
- You worship about 30% of your members at weekly worship.
- You have 38,000 of your children attending weekly Christian education classes.
- You worship in nine different languages.
- You provide support for all the rostered leaders (there are more than 700, including 300 retired pastors).
- You assist congregations in the call process and when congregations are experiencing conflict.
- You establish new congregations, renew congregations, and assist new ministry starts.
- You provide program support for congregations and provide training for lay leaders.
- You have many global mission connections, especially your companion synods in Nigeria and Leipzig.
- You support the young people with training, mission trips, camping opportunities, and youth gatherings.

All of this and much more is what the Minneapolis Area Synod is doing in mission and ministry.

I commend all of you, the Minneapolis Area Synod, for all you do in Christ's name. There is much for which to be thankful. In particular, I thank Bishop Craig Johnson for his excellent service as bishop of this synod for the past 10 years. I thank the synod's officers and council for their faithful work on our behalf this past year. I thank the synod staff for their excellent and faithful work this past year, and especially their service during this interim time. I thank all of you for welcoming me and offering your support during my ministry as your interim bishop. Soon there will be a new bishop elected at the Synod Assembly on February 17-18, 2012. I invite you all to hold in your prayers the Minneapolis Area Synod bishop's election. I know you will join me in giving your full support to our new bishop. Let us press on with hope and joy.

# Bonfire Ministry (a joint collaboration with House of Hope and First Lutheran)

Bonfire Ministry certainly caught fire in 2011. Now officially recognized as a 501(c)(3) nonprofit. Bonfire is set to move forward with our outreaches to our communities. Here are some of the highlights from 2011.

### **Responding to Weekend Childhood Hunger**

The decision was made to help end childhood weekend hunger in our community by providing weekend snack packs. Over 5,600 weekend kid snack packs were assembled and delivered to students at Forest and Meadow Lake Elementary schools.

Additional Bonfire partnerships expanded to include Emergency Food Network, local food shelves, student volunteers from Cooper High School, local community volunteers, Reinhardt, Kellogg and Kraft!

### Health and Wellness

Bonfire was awarded a three-year grant from the Fairview Foundation for our Parish Nurse program. Our Parish Nurse, Debbie Haney was able to:

- Conduct 201 individual blood pressure checks conducted between the Bonfire congregations and 3 events at the New Hope Farmers Market
- Made 15 Parish Nurse home visits
- Had 17 individual office visits by congregation members seeking advice and assistance
- Visited our North Ridge Senior Living residents 55 times; visited our North Ridge Nursing home residents 17 times
- The Health and Wellness Committee through a training grant from the Fairview Foundation sponsored: Two Alzheimer's Educational Sessions with over 30 participants at each session "Powerful Tools for the Caregiver" series. Held bi-monthly Caregiver Support Group meetings at House of Hope Lutheran Church

### Joint Worship

Joint worship celebrations were held for Good Friday (at First) and Thanksgiving (at St. James).

### Wild Fire

Youth from eight different congregations continue to meet monthly and grow in their relationships with God and one another.

Between 100 and 150 men gathered quarterly for dinner, inspired by speakers and programs.

# A Note from Council President John Lindstrom

If 2010 was the year of 'the Cookie", then 2011 was the year of 'the Rookie". As many of you knew when I was elected, I had never served on the Church Council. I must thank my predecessor, Joel Anderson, for handing over the presidency during a period of relative calm and financial stability. I credit the members of the Church Council (many of them were rookies, too) as well as the Finance Committee for seeing to that.

This was a year that saw some important improvements at St. James. Through the dedicated efforts of the Property Committee we were able to upgrade the heating and air conditioning system in the Lifetime Learning Center and start the process of replacing our energy management system with a much needed, more efficient, system. We also saw the installation of the handicap-access door at the main entrance. It was through the generous donations of so many people that we were able to meet these needs.

In keeping with our theme, "Reflecting the Light of Christ in Crystal," 2011 saw St. James continue an active role in the growth of the Bonfire Ministries. Fueled by the passion of many of our members, the Parish Nurse program was funded. This is an important part of our community outreach as well as providing an important service to many members of our congregation. The establishment of the Kid Pack program is also a sign of our commitment to those around us who live every day in need. What I have seen is that there are many, many people within our who serve others.

I also learned that there are many levels of leadership within our congregation, and many people who demonstrate great leadership, even though they don't carry a title. One of my goals for this year was to begin finding and developing the next generation of leaders who will take our congregation ahead in the coming years. Many of our young members, and especially those recently confirmed, have shown a great potential through their active church lives and their personal beliefs.

Perhaps what I appreciated most this year was being able to spend time with both our Pastors, and through our discussions I began to see myself and my role here at St. James, in a very different light. I realized that life is not about waiting for Christ to return, but living with Christ every day. I see him in the faces of our congregation; by the way we greet each other and welcome strangers into our church. His voice can be heard in the stories we share. His hospitality without partiality is the heart of St. James.

As I look back over the year I have to say that I was truly blessed to be the President of the St. James congregation. I want to thank all of you for your support. As I look ahead to 2012, my plan is to remain aboard as an active member of the Council. I also want to reach out to our youth and young adults and help them discover their leadership talents. The finance committee continued to meet the second Monday of the month during 2011.

### **Church Council**

The church council continued to meet the third Monday of the month in 2011. The council came up with creative new ways to raise funds having volunteered to color their hair to raise money for the new HVAC system. Pastor David sported purple hair, Pastor Jill had streaks of green put in, John Lindstrom had blue, Brad Teale and Penny Janowiec both had red. Members of the property committee also joined the fun: Tom Ritter had red hair and George McClure had yellow hair. What a colorful way to raise money!

### **Property Committee**

In 2011, the property committee met the first Monday of each month. They hosted a spring and fall clean-up with great attendance. Some other projects included:

Board members attended Twin City area library workshops for new ideas for library promotion.

### Endowment

St James maintains several Endowment Funds where members continue to make gifts such as memorials, distributions from their estates, etc. The earnings on these funds make it possible for St James to do mission beyond what is done through our Mission and Ministry budget.

A gift from the Ruth Lund Scholarship Fund was made to Kaitlyn Ferguson again in 2011. This scholarship gift assists Kaitlyn as she studies at Luther Theological Seminary preparing for Ministry.

Earnings on money in the St. James Endowment Benevolence Fund made it possible to provide start-up funds for the Forest and Meadow Lake Elementary Kid Packs (weekend snack packs). The outreach will include establishment of many partners in order to regularly provide Friday snack packs (kid packs) for the weekend. The packs include applesauce, ready Mac, crackers and cheese, and dried fruit. This is a case of our Endowment Funds bearing much fruit throughout the neighborhood.

### Archives

The mission of the St. James archives committee is to research, collect, and organize the historical records and materials meaningful to St. James. At the Oct. 8 fall clean up, the archives room was cleaned. A copy of the marvelous 2012 Bonfire Ministry calendar was purchased for the collection.

### Office

The office continued to operate smoothly with the help of many volunteers. A huge thank you to each and every one!

Each Friday morning, the bulletin stuffers assemble the bulletins for Sunday morning. In 2011, they also put together the annual report, neighborhood bags promoting the fall schedule, and NEAR bags. This is a dedicated bunch that we couldn't do without, plus we suspect they enjoy each other's company and the yummy treats.

Nancy Lohmann continues to proofread the bulletins and newsletters each week, a huge undertaking that she has graciously continued to do to make sure we have as few bloopers as possible.

### **Funeral Lunch Ministry**

A ministry of hospitality to a family in their time of need. Members are called and asked to furnish salads or cakes for meals following funerals or memorial services. Others are needed to help on the day of the service to set up, prepare food, serve and clean up. Volunteers are needed to help with this ministry. At this time, three people are calling to ask for food donations. Two or three more volunteers are needed to alternate for this responsibility. More helpers are also needed to set up, serve and clean up on the day of the service. Please contact the church office if you would like to serve in this important ministry.

### **EBAY Committee (EBC)**

In 2011, the EBC sold over 195 items, donated by St. James members, for more than \$2,580. Sales were made to customers in 37 states and 9 foreign countries. We also participated in the Victory Memorial Neighborhood sale held the first weekend in June. Our thanks to Tim and Becki Smith who permitted the EBC to use their home to display the items we offered for sale. Proceeds from this sale were \$1,128, more than twice the amount earned in the prior year sale. We believe this sale offers an opportunity for further sale increases with broader congregational participation.

After paying all related fees, the neighborhood and ebay sales provided over \$3,380 for use by the congregation for church operations. Our thanks to all the donors and to those who helped us with the neighborhood sale. We also ask for your continued donation of items to sell on ebay. This is an additional source of revenue for church use.

### Library

# **Confirmation Youth Ministry**

This year our church council asked us the question, "What is God doing among us?" I'd like to share with you some of what I've seen in 2011.

### What's God doing in Confirmation?

### What's God doing in our youth programs?

Leadership skills and spiritual growth that was nurtured in the early years is bearing fruit as the abilities of the students grow. Our youth are now comfortable sharing their skills and leadership with the congregation. They are not satisfied with maintaining programs, they want to make them better. They are working very hard to get to the ELCA Youth Gathering in New Orleans in 2012 and are building lasting relationships with each other, our congregation, and the greater community as they work. They asked for more opportunities for their age group on Sunday mornings and they received it. They asked for more ways to contribute to the congregation and they received it. They are sharing their energy and vision for the future with us and we can't help but be hopeful as we see God in action in them.

### What's God doing in the world through St. James?

This entire annual report will testify to the countless ways God blesses the world with the people of St. James. Three areas I participated in were: an Interfaith Seder at Temple Israel in Minneapolis; the ELCA National Assembly in Orlando, Florida; and the New Hope Mayor's Prayer Breakfast in New Hope. ### **Neighborhood Dance**

Another fun time was had by many St. James members and visitors at our fifth Annual Neighborhood Dance. We had a DJ, Bingo, mini-donuts, popcorn, root beer floats, ice cream, inflatables, snack walk, silent auction, and lunch. New this year was the Pirates' Treasure Chest and almost 200 people walked the plank to prizes. It was held inside and there was something for everyone to see and do and eat. Thanks to all who donated their talents, time, prizes, baskets, and knowledge to make this possible.

### Lutefisk & Meatball Dinner

Held on the Saturday before Thanksgiving. Coming November 17, 2012 - the 19th year; seatings are 4:00 p.m., 5:00 p.m. & 6:00 p.m.)

The mission of the Lutefisk and Meatball Dinner is to get to know others better while working on a fun project, and form a stronger church community. This is a great opportunity to open St. James to non-members and serve a Heritage dinner. About 80% attending are non-members invited by friends and members of St. James. Many have commented that St. James' Lutefisk dinner is the best they have attended (and some have attended many!) Profits are used to support kitchen and Wold Hall improvements and for supplies such as coffee.

From the humble beginnings of serving 100 people the first; year, more than 475 hungry lutefisk and meatball lovers enjoyed the dinner in 2011. To prepare and serve this great meal, many different groups of volunteers are needed. Preparations begin in mid-October. Volunteer opportunities include: preparing meatballs, white sauce, rice pudding, cole slaw and dressing, sauces and peeling potatoes. Then there's the homemade lefse- requiring 200 pounds of potatoes to make 650 rounds of lefse. That's not even getting close to the preparation of the lutefisk! Other jobs are setting up, serving and clean-up during and after the meal.

Through all of this, there is a lot of fun and laughter to be shared, building friendships. A committee of 6-8 begins planning in September and would welcome new members and new ideas.

### **Cosmic Bowling**

As a fundraiser for Kid Pack Outreach, an all-ages cosmic bowling event was held at New Hope Bowling in October. The cost was \$10. Everyone had a great time competing with Pastor David for the high score!

### **Car Care Saturday**

### **Global Health**

Global Health Ministries provides a gift of life through Lutheran health care work across the world. They provide financial support, recruit health care personnel, fund the training of national health care givers and locate, inventory and ship urgently needed medical supplies. The faithful "Helping Hands that Heal" from St. James again in 2011 worked on the sorting and inventorying of the medical supplies.

### **NEAR Food Shelf**

NEAR (Northwest Suburban Emergency Assistance Response) is a food shelf created and named in May 1974 by the pastors of First Lutheran, St. James, St. Raphael's, and Faith Lilac Way.

In 2011 NEAR registered 230 new families plus continuing to help all other families. Clients may come once every 30 days. Deliveries are made to clients with a doctor's handicap letter.

The food shelf has a group of six-plus volunteers each morning, stocking shelves and sorting donations. In the afternoon there are four volunteers packing groceries and distributing them to 20-24 clients. There is also a volunteer answering the phone from her home.

Food is distributed from 1:30 to 4:30 and on Thursday until 6:00 by appointment only. Besides their monthly food the clients receive an extra box during the summer for school age children, and at Thanksgiving and Christmas. Easter baskets are made for the children by St. Raphael's. In the fall 473 students were provided with school supplies. Birthday bags are prepared for the children. Each December there is a toy distribution at the Crystal Community Center for 293 families.

The NEAR boundaries are 62nd Ave. N. to 42nd Ave. N. and Hwy #169 to Victory Memorial Drive. NEAR has one half-time paid coordinator. All the rest of the workers are volunteers.

All new volunteers would be appreciated. NEAR thanks St. James for their continued support. Chuck Schneider, Jim-Emily Hauan, Nancy Dahlquist, Joyce Held, Mary Roening, Connie Blom, Martha Thompson, Ruth Stanchfield work each week and also work on special projects.

### St. James Quilters

Quilters meet on the second and fourth Tuesday of the month 9:30 a.m.-1:00 p.m. More than 200 large quilts and baby quilts are made each year. In addition many lap robes are made for hospice and nursing homes. They are donated to Global Health Services, Loaves and Fishes, N.E.A.R. food shelf, Home Free battered women's shelter, North Ridge Masonic Care Center, and North Memorial Hospice.

Quilts are for sale at any time by contacting the church office. They are on display in church in November, for the Lutefisk Dinner and Christmas Brunch. Proceeds go toward buying supplies for more quilts.

Fabric is available for volunteers to use to sew and donate tops, which the quilters will complete and distribute. Donations of fabric, yarn, sheets (new and used), blankets, and antique satin drapes are welcome. If you can thread a

### **Power of One**

Volunteers from St. James who truly care about children volunteer on a one-on-one basis or work in the classroom helping students at our neighborhood Forest School. ### DAYD

St James furnishes up to 15 drivers a month to deliver hot noon meals to those who are homebound. They spend 180 hours in this outreach ministry. We delivered almost 900 meals this year. New drivers are always needed. It only takes 90 minutes once a month to do one route. We retired five drivers by the end of 2011 and five more are snow-birding in the south. Could you give up one and one-half hours a month to drive a route? You are needed.

### Loaves and Fishes

St. James, in partnership with House of Hope Lutheran, has served at River of Life Lutheran Church (22nd and Fremont Ave. N. in Mpls) since 1984. The guests are provided a hot meal prepared and served with loving caring hands. The meal is: au gratin potatoes/ground beef, green beans, wheat bread/butter, fruit cup, bars, milk and coffee. St. James has nine members who fix the meal at 2:00 on the third Thursday of each month. House of Hope brings 12 servers.

St. James providers six. House of Hope members bake the treats. All guests have their basic needs for food, dignity, and respect met by the team.

St. James served 1,930 meals at a cost of \$.73 a meal in 2011. Three hundred dollars was also given for the kitchen remodel. The funds for this outreach come from the two congregations. The need is close to \$1,000 per year. Thank you for supporting this very necessary program.

The congregation also donated quilts in December. In February small hygiene items will also be donated.

# Worship & Prayer


