Through our visitation ministry to the homebound in our congregation, I have encountered faithful, courageous people who have built up our church during the past 60 years. These people continue to give generously, as they have throughout their lives, because they believe that the ministries of our church make a difference in the lives of both the members of St. James and in the lives of those blessed by our ministries. Despite the trials and difficulties of aging, our elders do indeed reflect the light of Christ in Crystal and in the other communities in which they now live.

We also are blessed with a strong cohort of long-standing members who are working or very actively retired and contribute generously to our congregation's ministries both financially and with their time, wisdom and skills. Many of these folks are actively engaged in maintaining our property, helping to host our annual lutefisk dinner, leading Mary Circle, supporting our quilting ministry, participating in our NEAR food-shelf ministry, joining on Sunday mornings for adult Bible study, helping

- Mary Circle. The Mary Circle continued to meet each month at 10:00 a.m. (except June, July & August) for pastor-led Bible study, fellowship and coffee.
- **Men's Group.** The men's group continued to have breakfast at Fat Nat's in New Hope the third Saturday of each month. Quarterly dinner gatherings with the Wildfire congregations also were well received.
